Charities and causes across the North to receive more than £50,000 of support

Train company TransPennine Express (TPE) has announced that applications from 17 different causes have been successful and will receive support as part of its £50,000 scheme.

Individuals and organisations were invited to apply for up to £5,000 of funding as part of TPE's annual grants fund, which supports projects that tackle youth unemployment, help improve the environment and promote social inclusion.

This year's winners include York based ToylikeMe, which has been awarded £4,855 for their 'Travelling TransPennine Toybox Trails' which will be donated to eight disability play centres, schools and early years settings. Thanks to Transform, St Gemma's Hospice in Leeds will receive £4,993 to improve their Path of Life memorial garden while a £5,000 grant will go to Manchester Young Lives to establish a new cooking class for 16-24-year olds.
