A new cross Forth rail tunnel is at the heart of a £22 billion rail revolution proposed by the Scottish Green Party to build a modern, zero-carbon network that is affordable and accessible to all.

The Rail for All programme should be a central part of Scotland's green recovery from the COVID-19 crisis, the party's transport spokesperson John Finnie has said.

The party says it would create thousands of jobs whilst delivering infrastructure that is essential to tackling the climate emergency and supporting long-term economic prosperity.

Passengers at Birmingham New Street are being urged to check their platforms throughout 2021 while major work takes place to improve future journeys.

From 24 January, a rolling programme of platform closures will begin so signalling equipment at the country's busiest interchange station outside of London can be completely overhauled.

Over the next 18 months state-of-the-art signalling is being installed to provide more reliable journeys for passengers.
