The COP26 climate conference will be disrupted by rail strikes after members of the RMT union backed industrial action.

An article on Glasgow Live says ScotRail workers will strike from November 1st to 12th amid a dispute over pay and conditions.

RMT members on the Caledonian Sleeper service, which is run by Serco, will also strike from October 31^{st} to November 2^{nd} and from November 11^{th} to 13^{th} .

In response, ScotRail says a pay offer, negotiated over several weeks, has been made to the trade unions. It continues that "to build a more sustainable and greener railway for the future and reduce the burden on the taxpayer, we need to change".

New data has been published from the Office of Rail and Road (ORR) showing that the UK is not electrifying its railways quick enough to meet Net Zero by 2050.

The statistical release shows that in 2020-21, 179 track kilometres were electrified, less than half the 448 kilometres required each year to meet Network Rail's target of a Net Zero railway by 2050.

Responding, David Clarke, Technical Director of the Railway Industry Association said: "We need to get a programme of electrification work underway today, so we can decarbonise the network, bring greater benefits to passengers and freight user, and support the UK economy as we look to 'build back better'."
