The latest rail news on Thursday, 18th February 2021

Fears are growing that Northern Powerhouse Rail may be scaled back after the government told its leadership to hold off submitting a business plan.

An article in The Times says Transport for the North had been planning to submit its case for the project to the transport secretary next month.

However, it has been asked to wait until the government's Integrated Rail Plan, which will set out the future of rail travel in the North of England and the Midlands, is published next month.

A rail bridge between Stonehaven and Montrose is set to reopen after major damage was repaired.

The article in The Scotsman says the bridge on the main line between Dundee and Aberdeen has been shut since January 15th after masonry fell from the side wall on the southbound side of the structure.

But the almost 180-year-old bridge is now set to reopen on February 22nd.

HS2 has started the search for a specialist contractor to build the high speed rail project's central control centre and maintenance depot, that will create around 500 long-term jobs in Birmingham's Washwood Heath.

The contract – worth an estimated £275 million – will see the winning bidder work with HS2 to transform the 30 hectare brown field site into the nerve centre of the HS2 network
