The latest rail news on Monday, 18th January 2021

Eurostar is "on the brink of collapse" and could go bust within months if it is not given financial aid, the government has been warned.

That's according to Kent Online, that says there are fears that the high-speed rail company, which runs lines through Ashford and Ebbsfleet, could fold as early as April after the damage caused by the coronavirus pandemic.

There are also concerns that a potential collapse could lead to increased rail fares for Kent residents on the same line to make up for lost funds.

Network Rail engineers are today kickstarting improvements to Portsmouth's railways and the landmark Landport Viaduct.

From today until Sunday, January 24, the line from Portsmouth and Southsea to Portsmouth Harbour will close, with the closure extending to Cosham and Bedhampton on the 24th for a number of other improvements, including track renewals.

The main focus of the work will be vital maintenance on a Victorian viaduct at Portsmouth and Southsea station.
