

In The News: 21st May

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Confidence among Scots in returning to public transport when lockdown restrictions are eased has nearly halved to just 17 per cent in a poll published today.

That's according to The Scotsman which says the dramatic reduction in the proportion happy with using trains and buses from 30% last week comes as the First Minister is due to set out the next steps towards more travel.

A transport transition plan with further details is due to be published shortly.



Several of the national newspapers have covered the news of the HS2 Old Oak Common station in west London being approved.

The Daily Telegraph writes how it is being built at the site of the a former Great Western Railway depot, will cost £1.3billion and open in 2029.

It will be one of only four stations on the first leg of the line between London and Birmingham.
