InTheNews: The latest rail news on Monday, 22nd May 2023

Network Rail has published its £44 billion, five-year plan (CP7) for the railway in England and Wales that sees increased investment in tackling climate change, improving train performance from current levels, investing in things that matter most to passengers and freight users, and making our 'green' railway, even greener.

In December the Department for Transport (DfT) published two key documents. One set out what it wanted

our railway to deliver (High Level Output Statement – HLOS) and the other, how much funding it was making available (Statement of Funds Available – SoFA).

Over the last two years, and more intensively over the past three months, Network Rail has been working on plans to deliver the best railway it can for the amount of money available – £44.1bn, which, after adjusting for changes in electricity costs, is £1.8bn more than CP6 (2019-2024).

Rail infrastructure specialist Spencer Group is making significant progress on the construction of a £26.5 million station in South Leeds.

Situated between Morley and Cottingley, the White Rose Rail Station will be located on the main trans-Pennine route to Manchester via Huddersfield.

It will be a two-platform station providing improved access to the adjacent White Rose office park, shopping centre and bus interchange.

There were more than 90,000 extra journeys on the Merseyrail network across the seven-day Eurovision period, the operator has revealed.
