

The latest rail news on Wednesday, 24th February 2021

One in seven rail commuters could switch to cars post-pandemic, train bosses fear as they renewed calls for simpler fares.

An article in The Daily Telegraph, says The Rail Delivery Group, the body which represents train operators, surveyed 3,000 people and found 15 per cent of former rail users planned to travel by car once lockdown is eased.



In a blog post, Jacqueline Starr, RDG chief executive, wrote: "As we emerge from lockdown, updated regulations must enable train operators to give people what they want – a radically simplified system of products based on easier fares with offers tailored to suit different needs."

Flooding caused chaos for train passengers yesterday as Scotland faced a day of gales and torrential rain.

An article in the Daily Express (Scotland) said that divers had to check the stability of several bridges as gusts of up to 70mph were recorded.

A major upgrade to transport more freight by rail to and from Southampton is complete.

Freight services between Southampton, the Midlands and the North can now carry up to 20 per cent more goods thanks to track, signals and sidings improvements.

Trains once restricted to 520 metres in length can now be extended up to 775 metres in length, or 14 extra containers per train.
