

## In The News: 28th May

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We start with the news today of the plans to build one of Britain's biggest transport hubs on the site of a 160-year-old rail depot for the HS2 project.

The article in The Times says Toton sidings, between Nottingham and Derby, would be transformed into potentially the country's busiest transport interchange outside London.

The £2.7 billion proposal would create new rail, bus, road and tram links to a 'mega-station' being built to serve the HS2 line.



Sir John Peace, chairman of Midlands Connect and Midlands Engine says the arrival of HS2 is a watershed moment for the region and an opportunity that must be grasped with both hands.

A former head of New York's public transport system will be London's next transport commissioner.

The news of Andy Byford's appointment features in several of the papers, including The Herald which says the 54-year-old starts his new role on June 29th.
