

Rishi Sunak has been urged to use the Budget to invest in a rail line to reap an economic windfall.

An article in the i paper says civic and business leaders are calling on the Chancellor to back improvements for the East Coast Main Line after research suggested that these could promote £11 billion of economic benefits.

Meanwhile the Railway Industry Association has called on the Government to put rail at the heart of the

Its three main recommendations for the Chancellor includes recognising the importance of rail in the long term, publishing the Rail Network Enhancements Pipeline, and standing by commitments to deliver major

upgrades and publish long-term industry plans.

The Chancellor is due to deliver the Budget speech at 12.30.
