Network Rail will invest more than £120 million of Scottish Government funding in the next three years to boost the electricity power supply into Scotland's railway network.

The investment will see six new feeder stations at strategic locations across the network and a further nine sites upgraded to increase the resilience and reliability of the infrastructure for the operation of electrically powered passenger and freight traffic.

As well as increasing the resilience of the existing network, the new connections to the national grid via the feeder stations will increase the overall capability of the 25kV electrified network.

South Western Railway (SWR) has announced the phased rollout of body-worn cameras for staff on board trains and at stations across most of its network.

The cameras are being introduced to deter and reduce anti-social behaviour on trains and stations, as well as to act as a deterrent to assaults, threats and abuse experienced by staff.

An article on Surrey Live says after an initial trial for staff working out of Fratton depot launched in June 2021, the cameras are currently being integrated into operations at Guildford, Farnham, Woking and Richmond stations.
